From the Headmaster

Here at school over the last couple of weeks the teachers have been busy writing reports. We make use of reports to praise successes as well as to inspire and challenge girls towards new heights. At schools across the country, this has not always been the case, as illustrated by these gently amusing extracts from old school reports which were published in the Daily Telegraph a couple of years ago:

The improvement in his handwriting has revealed his inability to spell.

French is a foreign language to Fowler.

This boy does not need a scripture teacher. He needs a missionary.

Henry Ford once said History is bunk. Yours most certainly is.

For this pupil, all ages are dark.

Unlike the poor, Graham is seldom with us.

He's given me a new definition of stoicism: he grins and I bear it.

That they seem to relate mostly to boys reflects perhaps more the readership of the Daily Telegraph than the idea that girls' reports of yesteryear were any less blunt.

In educational terms, there are two types of school report. We can send home a summative assessment of your child's progress or a formative one. Both are valid. The former, summative, is the traditional end-of-term report which marks out notable achievements, offers, praises and, of course, tips for improvement. The latter, formative, is more likely to come mid-term and should be used as a springboard for learning and an indication of next steps.

In the recent parents' questionnaire, there was considerable warmth of feeling for the full end-of-year and end-of-term reports which we currently issue. There was also a call from a large number of respondents for more regular feedback on the progress that your daughters are making. In September, Miss Zugg, Academic Deputy Head, will be writing to parents outlining a new system of regular progress cards and reports which will incorporate the best of both worlds. Moreover, I am keen to use regular reporting as an opportunity for the girls to reflect upon their learning and, regularly, to talk through their academic progress with their form tutors. This is a hard-working school where year-onyear the pupils excel and where they exceed any measure of expectations which could be considered as a national norm. That said, it is not the Francis Holland way to rest on our laurels and, properly introduced, a revised structure will be a tool to support learners both academically and pastorally. More details to follow in September.

We have several members of staff who are leaving Francis Holland for pastures new at the end of this term and I

would like to take this opportunity to wish them every success and delight in their new roles or in a life beyond teaching. With many thanks to Ms Hilton and Miss Lindsay who covered maternity placements this year; to Mr Chiverton and Miss Laytham for their exceptional contributions as Heads of Year to the Thirds and Upper Fourth pupils; and also Mrs Anjali Martin for her outstanding leadership as Head of Mathematics; and to the following teachers and support staff: Mrs Denniston; Miss Lewis; Miss Thomson; Ms Shah; Miss Hallett, Miss Oloumi, and Miss Gaude for their tremendous service to Francis Holland School. Best wishes to Mrs Lombard who will be leaving FHS on maternity leave. There is a special article on the first page about Mrs Drummond who has served the school with distinction for thirty-five vears and a full valete will be written for each of the other teachers in the school magazine which comes out in the autumn.

Meanwhile, the school is in good heart and your daughters have worked very hard; and they have earned a good summer break. Best wishes for the holidays.


















Step by Wicked Step – Junior Play

At the end of last term, I auditioned about 60 girls in the Thirds and Lower Fourths for the Junior Play. I had decided to produce Anne Fine's adaptation of her own novel Step by Wicked Step.

In this story, a group of children are on a school trip. Four are asked to travel with their History teacher who is driving the minibus full of luggage, behind the coach. In fact the minibus arrives at their destination, a big old house, now serving as a hostel for children on activity holidays – not unlike Knapp House I suspect – long before the coach does, thanks to a flat tyre on the motorway. Their teacher tells them to go up and bag the dormitory on the top floor, to make it easier when the others

finally arrive, and as they pick beds and explore a bit, they wonder why they were selected for the minibus: after a while it dawns on them – they are all children with second families.

First up we have Claudia, a little bit shy, but she has her own circle of friends, and that doesn't include Pixie, the other girl in the foursome, who has the kind of confidence Claudia can only dream of and attitude to go with it. Then we have Colin, quiet, with a reputation for not concentrating in class, whose Dad simply upped and left when he was little; one day Colin hopes he will see him again, but for now he will simply get on with his mum and new family. Finally there is Ralph, sensible, slightly swotty, opinionated but kindly; Ralph's

great gift is the ability to see the funny side of things, and this has helped him cope with a whole series of his dad's partners, some very peculiar indeed.

As the play unfolds we discover all four stories - Claudia's, Ralph's, Colin's and Pixie's. And these are compared to the much sadder experiences of a Victorian teenager, Richard, whose experiences are much tougher, and whom we get to meet when Pixie discovers an old diary in a secret annex, which just happens to lead off their dormitory. Cheesy, I know, and a little bit "Scooby-doo".








GCSE and A Level Art Exhibitions
