From the Headmaster

On Tuesday 1st October 1878, a small group of girls gathered outside No. 6 Upper Baker Street in London. Together, they formed the original cohort of pupils for the Church of England High School for Girls, the first of two schools founded by The Reverend Canon Francis James Holland. Now known as Francis Holland School, Regent's Park, the spirit of the school that opened that day has survived two world wars, financial crises and periods of profound social and economic development: in some ways, our school has changed out of all recognition, but it remains true to the principles established by Canon Holland 140 years ago.

Much will be told and retold of the history of Francis Holland over the coming twelve months as we celebrate, together, our 140th birthday. The school has planned a series of events which straddle both the current academic year and the next. The purpose is to mark this notable anniversary both enjoyably and appropriately.

Our usual birthday celebration, beginning across the road at St Cyprian's Church, will kick start this year of jubilee on Thursday 8th February 2018. We will hear from the Head Girl as she delivers her keynote address for the year, "In praise of Rev Canon Francis Holland". Back here at school, lessons are suspended for most pupils as we enjoy the annual drama competition.

There will be a 140th birthday cake baked especially for the day, and in the evening a joint parents, students and staff choral concert will be held in the School Hall.

Just after Easter, and before the Upper Fifth go on study leave, we have a whole school photograph in Regent's Park and we also have a fundraising drinks party for parents planned for early May. Later next term, there will be a special event at our annual Sports Day. A birthday picnic lunch will be laid on for pupils, parents and friends of the school; there will be another birthday cake and some aerial photography as we try to spell out the letters FHS and the number 140.

On the exact date of our 140th birthday, 1st October 2018, we plan a balloon release of five hundred balloons in the school colours. Each one will have an individual Instagram reply card attached so that we can track their progress in a thoroughly modern way. The girl whose balloon makes it the furthest from London will be celebrated in assembly and will win a prize (perhaps cake?).

In that same month, we plan a 140-mile cycle ride from Ivor Place to the picturesque village of Groffliers, near Le Touquet where we can celebrate the grand opening of our new French study centre. This, of course, is the school's birthday present. Many boys' schools

have outward-bound and activity centres around the UK and abroad, but we will be the first school for girls to own a property which can be used for activities ranging from study weekends to watercolour painting workshops and from induction courses to horse riding camps. Active parents and senior girls will be welcome to join me on the 140-mile cycle ride. All others are welcome to drive over for the opening ceremony. Details will be sent out nearer the time. Please rest assured that there will be another birthday cake!

Finally, in February 2019, as we approach the end of the year of celebrations, the Francis Holland School choir has been invited to lead the sung worship at evensong at St Paul's Cathedral. All parents and girls will be invited to join in with this event.

It is an exciting year for Francis Holland School. I hope that all parents will make the time to engage with the celebrations in one way or another and, as I have already mentioned to the pupils, I welcome other suggestions of how to mark this occasion via the School Council.

French cultural attaché's visit to Francis Holland School




Farewells

It is a story about change and adaptation to the new world of Year 7. A suitable story for those little sisters of already lucky FHS pupils contemplating the move to 'big school'.



Maths in Action

On Wednesday 22nd November, the Lower Sixth visited the Emmanuel Centre for a series of Mathematics lectures. They ranged in content from the more abstract topics of the platonic universe to proving Fermat's last theorem, and perhaps most interestingly, included a performance of 'Bohemian Rhapsody' on the electric guitar by Dr Mark Lewney about trigonometry and its link to binary.

There were five lectures in total, and also a brief talk about exam technique and common mistakes made at A level, which provided helpful suggestions for ways to avoid simple errors in examinations and to gain practice for the harder questions at the end of





the paper. The first lecture involved algebraic number theory and discussed how abstract mathematics sometimes don't fit in our universe – as well as featuring a particularly bright pair of trousers, worn by the speaker, Dr Buzzard. The following two lectures were less conceptual, focusing on how Fermat's last theorem was proved, and misinterpretations of statistics in the news. These were followed by a talk, and various guitar solos, from Dr Lewney on 'string theory' and

trigonometry, and then from a data scientist, who explained the role of Mathematics in cybersecurity and detecting viruses.

Overall, the lectures were thoroughly engaging and insightful and demonstrated different areas of research in Mathematics, as well as the relevance of Mathematics in current affairs.

Upper Fourth trip to Hadrian's Wall









On Friday 10th November Lower Fourth, accompanied by Miss Merrigan, Miss Williams and Miss Greenhalgh, set off for a weekend visit to Hadrian's Wall.

On Saturday, we went to the Roman Army Museum and three Roman Forts that would have been stationed along the wall. At the museum we listened to a talk from a British auxiliary soldier hologram, and were given free time to roam and learn about the Roman soldiers ranks and uniforms. Next, we went to the Roman Fort Vindolanda, where the Vindolanda tablets came from, followed by the larger Chesters Roman Fort and afterwards the Housesteads Fort, where we were shown how the Roman plumbing would have worked. My favourite was

Chesters Roman Fort because of how big it is and the fact that you could see typical village houses (aedificium vicanum formae solitae) and shops/inns (taberna). That night, we went to a local pub which had very nice food, before going back to the hostel to watch Eagle a film based on Hadrian's Wall and set in the Roman times.

On Sunday, we all hurried to pack our bags so that we could go on a walk, along where Hadrian's Wall would have been two thousand years ago, before returning to London. On the walk we were able to see the beautiful countryside, though because of the wall's old age it was mostly all knocked down. Near the end of our walk we found a place where you had to go



downhill by stepping on rocks. Most of us went down for fun, but soon had to come back up because it was freezing. I definitely recommend this trip to anyone who would like to visit Hadrian's Wall and learn more Latin. *Valere!*

FHS Debating Update

The Senior Debating pair of Eleni Papanayotou and Izzie Klug, Lower Fifth, won their 1st Round in the English-Speaking Union's Schools' Mace, the oldest and largest debating competition in England. FHS defeated North Bridge House Senior School, while opposing the motion, "This House would add e-sports to the Olympic Games". Melissa Benn, journalist, writer and guest judge for the evening, commended our girls on the strength of their preparation, but also their succinct and probing Points of Information in response to their opposition's arguments. The next round will take place this term as the girls compete for a place in the Regional Finals.

The Junior Debating team competed in their 1st Round of the London Junior Debating League, hosted by fellow group members Latymer Upper School (2017's competition winners). In the first debate, Molly Campbell Butcher, Alice Mitcheson and Amelia Rayner-Cook proposed that "This house would make all schools co-educational". The

FHS trio took the win, defeating the boys from John Lyon School. In the second debate, Amelia remained on board, joined this time by Amber Hill and Mihika Joshi. Opposing the surprise, unprepared motion: "This house would ban animal testing", our girls particularly impressed the judges by addressing exactly his feedback from the first debates: signposting ("My first argument is... my second argument is...), and keeping the argument exactly relevant to the motion. This time, however, the girls were narrowly beaten by Sacred Heart High School.

On a very positive note, the points accrued in this round stand us in good stead ahead for the next round in February. On the night, Lara Taberham was an integral member of the squad as a member of the Floor, asking the difficult questions of our opposition. Particular thanks go to Courtney McNeil, Lower Sixth, who came in support and to act as a judge in other, impartial debates.
