Dear Parents,

As you know, the Governing Council has announced the appointment of Mr Charles Fillingham, currently a Deputy Head at City of London School, as Headmaster from January 2016. Mr Fillingham will be attending our school Prize-giving Evening in the Cadogan Hall on October 14th. The success of Sixth Formers in public examination results this summer will be one of the many achievements to be celebrated at this year's Prize-giving. Almost 20% of the Upper Sixth achieved A* grades at A level and 90.2% were awarded grades A* and B. These results are a tremendous achievement and we congratulate the Upper Sixth on securing some of the most competitive university places in this country and the USA. Congratulations also to our current Lower Sixth, who achieved some of the best GCSE results in the country: 96.6% were awarded A*, A or B, and a significant number of girls achieved exclusively A and A* GCSE grades. Such tremendous public examination results are a testament to the hard work and talent of both the girls and their teachers.

During the summer holidays, Mme Spera and Mme Gustave led a most successful French trip to Montpellier. Also in the holidays, Gold Duke of Edinburgh Award Expeditions were successfully completed in the Peak District and Snowdonia by several girls in the Sixth Form. The theme for this year's event was *Amazing Science* and focused on current science research that may have a significant effect on our lives in the future. There was a fascinating array of projects ranging from how immunotherapy can cure cancer to how astronauts can live on Mars. The finalists presented their research to an audience of over 200 people consisting of Lower Fourth parents, pupils and staff.

The event was judged by Dr Jenny Cook, a research associate at King's College London. The winners were Abigail Howard-Yam and Tilly Sykes with a project titled *Can we live forever?* Two groups were chosen as runners up: Amelia Carney and Devina Loomba with their project *Controlling Dreams* along with Amy Cash and Isabel Ritchotte who researched *Optogenetics: a cure for amnesia.*

The packed audience were given excellent presentations and maybe in the future a number of the Lower Fourth pupils will pursue scientific careers and ensure these research areas enhance and improve our lives.



FHS pupil becomes the world's youngest Primary Coach for the McGuire Programme

Over the next few months I will be attending an intensive training course with the McGuire Programme to become a primary speech coach in order to help those who stutter. I myself have suffered from a stutter since childhood and joined the McGuire Programme in year eight when I was thirteen.

The McGuire Programme, founded in 1994 by Dave McGuire, is an international organisation run and attended by people who stutter. At this life-changing course I learnt both how to physically control my breathing with a new method of breathing and began to face the psychological barriers built up over many years.

Moreover, since my first course I have had to take on challenges myself every day, taking full responsibility of my condition which was difficult to do as a young child. The core of the McGuire techniques I have learnt are to assertively accept my disorder by disclosing to people about my stammer. Over the last five years I have slowly progressed onto my road to eloquence; I returned to courses both to help my own recovery and coach other new students. In doing this, I took sessions, lecturing up to a hundred people, guiding and telling them about my own experiences.

In November I will be attending a staff training course where I must take an examination and be evaluated over a certain number of days to become an official speech coach. Although I have come a very long way since my first course, stammering is still a major part of life, allowing me to learn from my mistakes and enjoy successes. I would like to appeal to anyone who either knows someone who suffers from this debilitating disability or has a stutter themselves, the McGuire Programme is, in my opinion, the only way to get true control over stuttering and make yourself into a stronger, more eloquent version of who you truly are.

Many congratulations to Xiusi Li in the Upper Sixth who was shortlisted for the National Student of the Year Award and won highly commended for Mathematics.




During the summer holidays, girls from the Sixth Form took to the hills of the Peak District and Snowdonia to complete their Gold expeditions.

Summer Camp was a highly rewarding experience. Most of the kids were telling us that they didn't want to go home because they were enjoying it so much. In the evenings the children had to fill in diaries; it was lovely to do this with the kids because they wrote such nice things about what they had done, that they made it all worthwhile."

A big and heartfelt thank you to all of the girls and to my colleagues for their hard work, energy and dedication in making this year's camp a real success. Planning is now under way for next year's Summer Camp, when we look forward to celebrating our tenth year.


On Friday 11th September the students of A Level English Literature and Theatre Studies, accompanied by their teachers, went to see the new production of Brontë's masterpiece that has just opened at the National Theatre. This production originally shown at the Bristol Old Vic last year offered a new and vibrant interpretation of the novel. The students were intrigued by the set — a permanent square tilted set on different levels, with ladders and slopes, wrapped around a band of live musicians. As we followed Jane on her journey, locomotion was suggested by the actors running on the spot, accompanied by rhythmic drumming and repetition of the place names the imaginary coach passed; and locations were suggested by objects descending from the ceiling, such as framed family portraits, aproned Lowood smocks and crystal chandelier bulbs to suggest the grandeur of Mr Rochester's home Thornfield.

The company of nine actors and musicians played all the roles with enormous energy. Bertha Mason's presence was suggested by laughs and melodies, hauntingly provided by a fabulous singer in flame red taffeta. Jane, by contrast wiry and heavybooted, was played brilliantly by Madeleine Worrall. The production was fertile ground for our A Level Theatre Studies students who were enthralled by the range of non-naturalistic presentational techniques, and for the A Level English Literature students the rare opportunity of seeing an adaptation of one of their set examination texts provided a superb start to the A Level course, offering a powerfully feminist reading of the text and much food for thought.
