## From the Headmaster

I attended an excellent lecture at the Nuffield Institute in London's Bedford Square last month. The title of the event was 'Social Mobility and Education in Britain' and it was a book launch for a new publication of the same name by two academics from the University of Oxford.

It seems that absolute social mobility in Great Britain has stagnated over the last thirty years and that a child who is born into the highest socioeconomic class is now twenty times more likely to find a top-class job in adulthood than someone who is born into the lower socioeconomic group. This may not come as much of a surprise, but it also seems that increasing numbers of young people these days must face a future of downward social mobility than might have been the case in the past.

Parents are not keen on the prospect of their children falling down social rankings and there is an increasing national trend, for those who can afford it, to support their child educationally through private tutoring. In some London boroughs as many as twenty percent of parents also opt for independent schooling in order to maximise chances for their children. Francis Holland School has been an independent school for 141 years and it is serving its pupils excellently.

Naturally, schools of all types aim to offer an education to children which gives them every option to decide their own future. Adults who can boast an impressive list of academic gualifications are more likely to be able to make their own career decisions, rather than having choices made for them. Beyond the academics, it is noteworthy that interpersonal skills, leadership skills and teamwork skills are key measures of employability. This latter set of qualifications have been and are continuing to be highlighted to our pupils by this term's guest speakers as part of the annual 'Women of Influence' lecture series.

At the start of term, I shared a catchphrase with the girls: "Great Minds Meet Many Minds". If your daughter wants to be known as the proud possessor of a great mind then she must be prepared to meet with, to listen to and to consider the reflections of a great many other people. Some of our guests this term are controversial and some of them will challenge your daughter's worldview – I consider this to be an essential element of the education which we offer at Francis Holland School. We strive to provide here an environment where pupils learn to come to their own informed decisions. Whilst we always listen respectfully to what our guests have to say, this must not be a place where we accept all opinions unquestioningly, nor one where we rush to judgement. Francis Holland girls are being equipped to think independently.

I have been impressed by the girls' response to our guests so far and I will continue to enjoy the series throughout this term.





## New Sport Website!




There are many options available on the website. For example, you can navigate to our sports calendar via the main menu, then select the day you are interested in and see all the activities on that day.


