## WELCOME



### From the Headmaster

In assembly at the start of this term I asked the pupils whether they thought that Francis Holland School is having a purple patch (a run of success). Naturally, I also answered the same question and suggested that our wonderful school is riding the crest of a wave: the A level results are very good; the GCSEs are excellent; there are more sports teams than ever before; senior pupils have taken on new leadership roles in clubs and societies; the school is vastly oversubscribed at all entry points; and we have begun a programme of investment in the building with refurbishments to the science laboratory and library, the installation of a courtyard garden, and the creation of a drama studio. The school is in good heart and things are going well.

Beyond these developments, many of which are immediately evident to even a casual observer, the school is pressing ahead on several other fronts. Most interestingly, the Senior Deputy Head, Ms Slocombe, has introduced a new programme of in-service training for the teaching staff. She has commissioned seven small research groups, led by our teachers, to investigate different aspect of educational theory and practice. Topics this year range from 'Educating the most able' and 'Creativity in the classroom' to 'Cognitive load theory' and 'The impact of social media on the wellbeing of young people'.

Over the course of the two days which immediately preceded the new term, all these groups met for the first time

and the teachers began exploring their different topics under the direction of Ms Slocombe and our guest lecturer from University College London, Dr Sinead Vaughan. These collaborative enquiry groups will meet together five more times this academic year to discuss the latest educational literature and research. Each group's members will also work to instil best practice in their own lessons and will discuss their progress with colleagues in a spirit of collegiality. A poster conference is planned for the summer term in 2020 as an opportunity to share the fruits of each group's investigations with all of the other teams allowing the whole school to benefit from their research.

Very few schools nationally are engaged with academic practitioner research such as this. What is more, very few schools are actively building links with higher education in a focussed manner like at Francis Holland. This first partnership with UCL will soon be joined by another collaboration with King's College, London for teacher training in mathematics. Additionally, the school is now affiliated to the Chartered College of Teaching. Finally, I hope to be able to write to you later in the term to announce an academic in residence from Imperial College, London and also a visiting professor from the University of Oxford.

It is essential that outward-looking schools such as ours offer excellent programmes of continuing professional development to the staff, because it is essential that we have the very strongest team of teachers for the direct benefit of the girls. Since I joined the school myself four years ago, I have always maintained that the quality of the experience in the classroom day by day is the single most important element of your daughter's school life. Make no mistake, I value clubs and trips and sports and facilities too, but a great school requires great staff. To this end, I am particularly pleased that I have been able to appoint Ms Kristina Lewis as the Assistant Headteacher with oversight of teaching and learning, Oxbridge preparation, digital strategy and the scholarship programmes. Ms Lewis has come back to FHS after an absence of three years as Head of History elsewhere and her return is most welcome indeed.

Francis Holland School has countless strengths amongst which can be counted the quality of the lessons every day of the week.

#### A level and GCSE Results

Congratulations to all of last year's A level and GCSE students on their results!

There was much to celebrate about the A levels. A\* grades were very high at 18%, the percentages of A\* and A grades combined was well over 50%, and the important A\* to B measure has come in at around the 75% mark. One in three girls have been awarded all A or A\* grades. All of these results are well over double national averages in terms of academic success and they are a testament to the hard work of the students and their teachers. Most girls will be heading off to Russell Group universities, including Durham, Bristol and Oxford. Two girls have secured places at medical schools and five are moving on to Art Schools. We are delighted for them.

Upper Fifth achieved the best GCSE results in our school's history, with 55.7% achieving 9-8 Grades, and 83.0% 9-7. These outstanding results are evidence of the dedication and hard work of our students and the continued support of our teachers. We look forward to seeing them continue to triumph as they head into the Sixth Form.






### **Leavers' Prom**











### **Lower Fourth Science Week**

### **TRIPS**















The annual Lower Fourth Science Fair was converted this year into an experimental Science Week, which bonded problem-solving activities with explorations of the latest technological endeavours and rigorous independent research. The week began with a cyber challenge. The girls were put into teams and had to complete a series of puzzles using social engineering, encryption and open source intelligence. On the Tuesday, they became Crime Scene Investigators as they sort to solve a murder by analysing fake blood, DNA profiling, fingerprinting and completing quizzes. The winning team were

Morse B who achieved the 3rd highest score since the competition began in 2005. On Wednesday, the girls went to the Big Bang Fair before returning to school for their own Science Fair.

Parents, guests, teachers and girls from other year groups mingled amongst the displays beforehand chatting to the girls about their projects and the areas of personal scientific research. The nine groups of finalists delivered their presentations to a large audience in the Hall with passion and maturity, demonstrating impressive levels of understanding of some quite complex

scientific material. Dr Chloe Tartan, our judge and a graduate of Imperial College, UCL, Oxford and Cambridge universities, had the most difficult task of the evening which was to select the winner. After some deliberation, the winning presentation was: 'a glue to stop cancer' by Lola and Ines. Very well done to all the girls in Lower Fourth. From the heats to the final itself, it is a tribute to their efforts, knowledge and scientific understanding that they made the decisions so difficult!



On Friday 14th June, the Lower Sixth geographers went to Overstrand in Norfolk, as part of their independent investigation for the Pre U course. They studied the small-scale ecosystem of sand dunes, conducting a variety of tests to assess whether the sand dunes conform to the psammosere succession model. All groups were able to collect data in the field successfully, even during an unplanned infestation of flies! They then conducted lab work to test results and back in the classroom they presented data and analysed it effectively, evaluating its accuracy and reliability. 
